



APPROXIMATE SCALE IN FEET FOR MAP BELOW

Throughout the Festival, information, maps, answers to questions, etc., may be obtained at Festival Headquarters, located in the KCPA Level 5 at these locations during these hours: Thursday, 4:00 pm-8:30 pm (Studio Theatre); Friday, 8:00 am-10:00 pm (Foellinger Great Hall Entrance); and Saturday, 9:00 am-3:00 pm (Foellinger Great Hall Entrance).

The following are located on **Level 5/Lobby Level/Main Level:** Foellinger Great Hall, Colwell Playhouse, Tryon Festival Theatre, Studio Theatre, Krannert Room (Hospitality Room for Teacher/Sponsors).

Level 2

The following rooms are located on Level 2:

Choral Rehearsal Room, Drama Rehearsal Room, Orchestra Rehearsal Room, Foellinger Great Hall *stage*, Scene Shop, Prop Shop, Studio Dressing Rooms

Level 3

The following rooms are located on Level 3:

AV Room, Studio 1, Studio 2

To get to Level 3, go down the south stairs from the lobby, on the house right side of the Great Hall; or, from Level 2, go up the south stairs near the Audio Office.

Level 4

The following rooms are located on Level 4:

Ensemble A & B

To get to Level 4, go down the north stairs from the lobby, on the house left side of the Great Hall, go down to level 2. From level 2, go down second street and take a left passing Drama Rehearsal and Dance Rehearsal Rooms. You will then go up a flight of stairs to level 4.

Admission to Activities

All Festival registrants must have a ticket and name badge to attend Full-Length, Showcase, Opening and All-State performances. Workshops are not ticketed, but name badges must be worn at all times or you will be asked to leave. Some workshops may fill to capacity and participants may be turned away. It is wise to have a backup workshop in mind just in case. Students MUST wear their name badge to be allowed entrance to Friday evening activities.

Lost Badges

Name badges must be worn at all times. Replacement badges may be purchased at Festival Headquarters for \$3 each.

Swap Desk for Performance Tickets

Located in the KCPA Lobby (in the corridor next to Foellinger Great Hall), the Swap Desk will be open at 8:00 am-8:00 pm on Friday and 9:00-11:30 am on Saturday. Participants may trade any valid ticket for any available ticket. Students may not swap All-State tickets. In the event that Full-Length or Showcase tickets are still available 15 minutes before the beginning of a performance, remaining tickets (if any) will be distributed without the necessity of a trade.

Locations Across Campus

The Festival uses many buildings across campus. See the inside front cover for a campus map. All buildings are within relatively short walking distance from one another.

Directions from the Krannert Center to...

- Lincoln Hall, Gregory Hall, Foellinger Auditorium, Illini Union, and Natural History Building: Exit the west lobby doors (on either side of the KCPA Ticket Office) and cross Goodwin Ave. to the walkway between the two science buildings. Continue straight ahead until you reach the Main Quad. At the far south end of the Main Quad (to your left) is Foellinger Auditorium (the building with the dome). The building on the left (east) of Foellinger is Smith Memorial Hall. The building on the right (west) of Foellinger is Gregory Hall. At the far north end of the Main Quad (to your right) is the Illini Union. Natural History Building is located to the right (east) of the Illini Union.
- **Levis Faculty Center:** Exit the east lobby doors (on either side of Foellinger Great Hall). Levis Center is the dark brown building right across the street.
- Illinois Street Residence Hall (includes ISR Dining Center): Exit the east lobby doors (on either side of Foellinger Great Hall) and turn left. ISR is the 12-story building right across Illinois St.

Meal Cards

For those who have purchased a meal card, you can use it at **ISR Dining Center** on Friday, January 13 and Saturday, January 14 from 11:00 am-2:00 pm. The \$23.00 meal card is good for all-you-care-to-eat, cafeteria style dining. A wide variety of selections are available including vegetarian, vegan, and gluten-free options. THE MEAL CARD IS ONLY GOOD AT ISR DINING CENTER!

On-Campus Dining

Intermezzo Cafe, located in the KCPA Lobby (Level 5), is operating on a more limited scale than usual and will be offering sandwiches, wraps, and other grab-and-go items (no hot food).

There are several eateries located on the block just south of KCPA, including Dubai Grill, KoFusion, Subway, Rosati's Pizza, Basil Thai, Caffé Bene, Bab Plus, Tenko Tea, and BBQ Chicken. Other nearby eateries include Jimmy Johns and Caffe Paradiso (southeast of KCPA on Lincoln Ave.), plus Manolo's Pizza and Empanadas, Espresso Royale, The Bread Company, and Timpone's (just across Oregon St. at Goodwin Ave.).

Eateries in the Illini Union are also options for on-campus dining. On the main level (1st Floor), you can find Starbucks, Just Bee Açaí, Tropical Smoothie Cafe, and Quad Shop. Quad Shop sells grab-and-go snacks, Illini merchandise, toiletries, and bottled and fountain soft drinks. On the Lower Level, you can find Einstein Bros. Bagels and several vending machines.

Additionally, you may find some food trucks stationed in various places around campus. Their hours vary.



Parking on Campus

As a general rule, please follow all University parking signs and permits very carefully, and make sure this information is passed on to all drivers. **Neither the Festival nor the University will pay for parking tickets/fines.**

Buses/Trucks: If the vehicle cannot fit in a single, regular parking space, it will need to be parked in Lot F23 (on Florida Ave. near Lincoln Ave.). There is no room near the Krannert Center for parking large vehicles. Drivers should pick up and drop off students at streets adjacent to KCPA, but vehicles must be parked off-campus or in Lot F23.

Buses/trucks may park in Lot F23 after 4:00 pm on Thursday and anytime on Friday and Saturday.

Cars/Vans: On Thursday before 4:00 pm, limited parking is available for \$1.25/hour on the streets surrounding KCPA, in Lot D5 (KCPA garage), in Lot D9 (east of Illinois Street Residence Hall) and in Lot D22 (south of Levis Faculty Center). The University is in the process of removing its standard parking meters, so you may need to pay by app* as opposed to using quarters. Many parking spots are free in the evening, but check the spot's sign to be sure.

Parking restrictions on Friday are essentially the same as Thursday. On Saturday, University-owned parking lots around KCPA are available at no cost all day. Some parking spots do charge on Saturdays, so be sure to check the signage.



As a land-grant institution, the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign has a responsibility to acknowledge the historical context in which it exists. We are currently on the lands of the Peoria, Kaskaskia, Peankashaw, Wea, Miami, Mascoutin, Odawa, Sauk, Mesquaki, Kickapoo, Potawatomi, Ojibwe, and Chickasaw Nations. It is necessary for us to acknowledge these Native Nations and for us to work with them as we move forward as an institution with Native peoples at the core of our efforts.

Participation Guidelines

- Festival participants are expected to attend and be a part of Festival-sponsored activities and performances.
- Take full advantage of the Festival by arriving on time for workshops and performances. Tickets for performances are valid only until published performance times. At published curtain times, empty seats will be filled by participants who do not have tickets (except for All-State).
- If you, or your school, have performance tickets that you are not going to use or swap, please turn them in to the swap desk at least 30 minutes before curtain time.
- Information about the Ticket Swap Desk for ticket exchange can be found on page 2 of the Festival program. Under no circumstances shall tickets for any performance be exchanged for money.
- As an audience member, you are part of the performance, but you are not a performer. Therefore, good manners toward those on stage are extremely important.
- No one may save seats for any performance.
- No food or drink is allowed in the theatres and workshop spaces, with the exception of bottled water.
- The use of any audio or video recording device or camera in any theatre is prohibited. This includes cell phones and tablets.
- Please plan to maintain a full schedule for both Friday and Saturday. Get plenty of rest so that you do not find yourself losing interest or energy in the middle of the day. Many professionals and schools have donated time to provide quality workshops and shows. Please show your appreciation by attending every event that you can.
- You must wear your Festival badge to all events, including Friday night activities. On the front, your badge must include your full name and school name, and on the back should appear your sponsor's name and Festival phone contact. Note: A sponsor, monitor, or University staff member has the right to ask to see your badge. Replacement badges must be purchased at Festival headquarters (for \$3) if originals are lost.
- The use of drugs/alcohol during attendance at the Festival is absolutely prohibited. Parents of a student who is found in violation will be contacted and requested to remove the student immediately—no matter what time of the day or night.
- The University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign is a smoke-free campus. Smoking is prohibited in all University buildings, the Quad, and all other outdoor areas on campus. In addition, students are not allowed to smoke at any of the hotels.
- Vaping is also prohibited on campus.

- Students should travel in groups of at least two and inform their chaperone of their schedule. Emergency phones are located throughout the campus and will connect you to the campus police if needed. (Refer to back of name badge for numbers.)
- Curfew: City ordinance requires that no minor be on the streets without an adult after 11:00 pm on Thursday and 11:59 pm on Friday. In an effort to keep hotel behavior consistent among all schools and to keep the Festival a positive experience for everyone, the Festival has established a housing curfew. All students are expected to be in their rooms and quiet by 12:00 am Thursday and 1:00 am Friday.
- Please remember that you are representatives of your school's theatre program and conduct yourselves accordingly. The Festival is a time to share new ideas and concepts. It is expected that you will be polite, respectful, and receptive at all performances and workshops.
- Courteous behavior is also expected at Champaign-Urbana area hotels, restaurants, and stores.
- Participants acknowledge that photos/videos may be taken by authorized individuals and used for educational, instructional, or promotional purposes in any print, broadcast, and/or electronic media formats.
- Sponsors are asked to remind students that any content on social media sites and/or personal blogs/websites shall be appropriate to the IHSTF's mission and purpose, as well as students' roles as representatives of their schools.



LET'S SET THE PROPER TONE— TURN OFF THE CELL PHONE!

No calls, texting, or posting during performances or workshops! Students found using phones during performances will have their phones confiscated. (Confiscated phones can be picked up at the Festival Headquarters at Krannert.)

First Aid Services will be located in the KCPA Patron Services Office on Lobby-Level 5 of the Krannert Center during the hours of the Festival. In other emergencies, please call 911 (or 9-911 from a campus phone).



COVID-19 Information

The Festival will be following the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign's Event Guidelines, which are based on current local COVID-19 levels and CDC guidance.

- There are no COVID-19 vaccination/testing requirements for UIUC campus visitors. However, visitors from outside the campus community are encouraged to be fully vaccinated for COVID-19 if they are able to do so.
- Face coverings are not required at UIUC events.
 Individuals are always welcome to wear a face covering to protect themselves. The Festival is not providing face masks, so participants should bring their own if they wish to wear one.

• There are no social distancing or capacity restrictions at this time.



Carmel DeStefano

She fell into teaching theatre at the high school level by doing a favor for one of her professors and stayed with it for over thirty years, rst at the Academy of the Sacred Heart and later at Reavis High School. During her early years as the Head Drama Coach at Reavis, she was able to expand the drama students ' theatrical experiences through a variety of productions, competitions, theatre festivals, workshops, professional performances, and leadership training. Although drama was only an extra-curricular, Reavis students did it all. While teaching, her involvement with the ITA was primarily as a committee member for the IHSTF where she served in many capacities, including promotions, auditions, workshops, as All-State Director, and as Executive Director of Festival 2016. After retiring from teaching, Carm has served on the ITA Board of Directors as Second Vice-president, President-elect, and President.

The start of Mary McCarthy's life in the theater can be credited to her Freshman English teacher and the Leading Player. Minutes after entering the Lake Central High School auditorium at the behest of her teacher, she was in a front-row seat for a rehearsal of Pippin. The Leading Player said there was "magic to do," and she was hooked for life. Professionally, Mary served as the Technical Director at Amos Alonzo Stagg for nine years. She earned a master's degree in directing from Roosevelt University in 1997. After moving into administration at Victor J. Andrew High School, she facilitated the transition of the theater program to a new auditorium, added theater staff, and expanded the program to include a second full-length musical each year. She assisted in the development of a student-written, improv production, Two Chairs and a Table, and helped the group take the production to the Illinois High School Theatre Festival for the rst time in the school's history. She directed 17 musicals over the course of 12 years and assisted with numerous other productions as a producer and costumer. When the opportunity arose to repurpose an underused applied tech classroom, she created a new black box theater space to support both theatrical and musical productions. She led a district-wide effort to develop elective theater classes which, after a pandemic delay, began this year. When not working, Mary contributes to the artistic life of her community as a director and costumer for the Hyde Park Community Players and a costumer for the Hyde Park School of Dance. Mary is grateful for everyone she has worked with in the theater and for the students of Stagg and Andrew who really make the magic happen. She couldn't have done it all without the support of her husband, Peter, and daughter, Sarah. Special thanks to Sheila Sullivan for the award nomination and for her unwavering support for Andrew Theatre.

Radium Girls is a ctionalized play based on real events, set in Orange, New York but it could have taken place in Ottawa, Illinois. Dial painters in Orange led a lawsuit against the U.S. Radium Corporation to cover medical bills caused by using the radium paint. Five women who worked in a dial painting plant in Ottawa, led their own lawsuit with the Illinois Industrial Commision. The Illinois lawsuit, settled in 1932, resulted in new occupational labor laws. Workers had training and protective equipment, but radium paint was used until the 1970's. Victims and villains are hard to separate. Dial painters suffered horrible deaths but owners and inventors were not immune from radium poisoning. Pro t drove the decisions at the U.S Radium Corporation, instead of scientic research. Even as the companies discovered the effects of radium, they relied on the loyalty and silence of their workers. Money remained more important than the health of workers until protections became law.

Profiles of Schools Presenting Productions

Antioch Community High School • PUFFS OR SEVEN INCREASINGLY EVENTFUL YEARS AT A CERTAIN SCHOOL OF MAGIC AND MAGIC • The Sequoit Theatre Department is one teacher with a tech director. We have offer four levels of acting courses and two levels of Stagecraft. We put on three performances a year.

Collinsville High School • THE WAR OF THE WORLDS: THE 1938 RADIO SCRIPT • Collinsville High School is a four-year public high school with approximately 2,000 students enrolled. It is part of the Collinsville Community Unit School District 10 which covers 57 square miles and serves students from Collinsville, Caseyville and Maryville, as well as portions of Glen Carbon, Fairmont City, and Granite City.

Downers Grove North High School • *THE BOMB-ITTY OF ERRORS* • DGN Theatre is composed of several factions. We have our curricular classes, extra-curricular productions, drama club, and our Thespian Honors Society. DGN offers three levels of acting courses and two levels of technical theatre. Our production season features five shows throughout the year, and students collaborate with other departments to stage concerts, a variety show, and an Orchesis dance production. Drama club manages all of our social events, workshops, and field trips and organize activities for all of our students. Students gain points towards their Thespian membership and rank by participating in our classes, drama club events, and productions. The skills learned in theatre support each student in their growth and future.

Fieldcrest High School • *RADIUM GIRLS* • Fieldcrest High School with 270 students, is a consolidated district located in central Illinois. Located on I39 in Minonk, the school was formed when several small towns came together in 1992. The FHS Drama Department performs a fall play, spring musical and summer drama camp. Theater classes along with dual credit art and music classes are available. Anywhere from 25 to 60 students participate in the productions throughout the year.

Glenbard East High School • *MATILDA* • Glenbard East High School has approximately 2255 students. It is located in the west suburbs of Chicago and is in the village of Lombard. The theatre program's Artistic Director is Andy Bero. The program produces 3 main stage productions each year with 6 showcases scheduled for this year and a film festival.

Hinsdale South High School • *CARRIE: THE MUSICAL*• Hinsdale South High School is located outside of Chicago in the southwest suburbs of Darien, IL. Our high school has a student body of approximately 1,400 students. The theatre department produces a fall musical and participates in the IHSA Competitive Drama season in the spring. In addition, the Hinsdale South Theatre

program produces a school-wide Variety Show and an annual Improv Show. Hinsdale South is Troupe #878 of the International Thespian Society and has inducted thousands of students in its history.

Keith Country Day School • *SORRY, WRONG* NUMBER • Keith Country Day is a small, independent, college-preparatory school housing K-12 students that dedicates itself to preparing children for lives of meaning and purpose. Our Theatre Department for Upper School 9-12 offers both performance and technical classes, 3-5 performance opportunities a year, as well as enrichment field trips to professional and amateur shows in the region.

Lakes Community High School • AS YOU LIKE IT • Lakes Community High School is a school of just under 1,300 students in Northern Illinois. Eagle Theatre is made up of over 100 student designers, actors, technicians, and production leaders. We produce four main stage productions a year: a fall play, a winter musical and two student produced festivals where students do everything from writing to directing to producing to designing. LCHS offers five different theatre classes: Beginning Theatre, Studio Theatre, Studio Theatre Advanced, Stagecraft, and Stagecraft Advanced. Between the curricular classes and after school productions, our thespians can create a theatre experience that can meet their schedules and interests.

Lincoln-Way East High School • THE THEORY OF RELATIVITY • Lincoln-Way East High School is located in Frankfort, IL and is the home of the Griffins. There are about 2,700 students at LW East. Our theatre program produces two plays and two musicals annually, and provides year-round extra-curricular opportunities for actors, technicians, and musicians.

Maine East High School • THE PLAY THAT GOES WRONG: HIGH SCHOOL EDITION • Maine East HS is located in Park Ridge, IL a suburb of Chicago. The school has an enrollment of 1800 students and an extremely diverse population. Our students speak over 60 languages in their homes. The Drama Department produces 3 Mainstage and 2 Studio productions each year. There is a 4-year acting curriculum and a repeatable technical theatre course. Currently we have over 100 students participating in our cast, crew, and pit.

Saint Ignatius College Prep • *THE ADDAMS FAMILY* • The Saint Ignatius College Prep Harlequins have been in existence for over a century. Each year, the group presents a musical, a play, a series of Student-Directed One Acts and a 24 Hour Plays event. The group prides itself on building empathy and exposing the world to diverse humanistic themes through theatre.

Tinley Park High School • *ALICE IN WONDERLAND* • Our school is definitely an athletic-driven facility. We do not have our own stage; we share our theater with our TPHS

community for meetings as well as classes; in the spring we share with athletics as our spring musical is in the gym. Yet we have such talented groups of students and community support for what they are able to accomplish. Our administration is supportive of the Drama Club and would pay for additional costs we may incur in order to perform at the Illinois State High School Theater Festival.

Warren Township High School • BAD SEED • Warren Township High School is a four-year high school with an enrollment of 3900 students. Our Theatre Department is comprised of over 100 students who are engaged in the crew and cast as well as our drama club. Every year, students produce ve shows: Fall Main Stage, Dinner Theatre, Short Film, Spring Musical, and the Children's Show. Additionally, our students participate in Shakespeare

Slam annually. Finally, juniors and seniors have the opportunity to audition for our comedy/improv troupe, Giggles n' Bits. Two directors (plus a music director for musical) lead this program in collaboration with a drama council (student leadership). Our drama club holds monthly meetings in conjunction with service opportunities and eld trips.

Wauconda High School • *SPAMALOT* • The WHS Theatre Dept. produces 1 full length show and 1 full length musical each year. Additionally, the program is part of the Comedy Sportz High School League. Spamalot features the work of over 100 students in cast crew in pit. All students who auditioned or were interested in being part of the show were allowed with no cuts.
